The Year 2020-21 in St. Brendan's.

The Church is my home - Gavin T. Murphy writing in the Messenger Magazine produced by the Jesuits described his experience as a member of the Church:

The Catholic Church is like a diamond because it has contributed to the light and sparkle of my very being. I have grown up with it as if part of its body. The Church has enabled me to develop a deep relationship with Jesus. I have journeyed with my fellow Catholics through heartache, low periods and despair as well as through joys, consolations and hopes. If I stopped being a member of the Church, I would be like a broken branch or withered rose.

[Yet] it claims to be inclusive, outward looking and non-judgemental, but are there not elements of protectiveness, fear and often anger in its voice? How does the Church react to people who don't give God a second chance or even a second hearing? A strictness and rigidity can be seen when we are both harsh on ourselves and on others. Perhaps God is calling us to let go of the reins of control and be more true to the Gospel message of compassion and understanding.

However, I can hold together my deep love for the Church and my dependence on it while also tending to its wounds and giving helpful feedback. I can listen attentively and be gently honest. This seems to me a homely thing to do because like my family the Church lives with its struggles and differences as well as providing space for its members to return to one body.

Introduction to Sacred Space – The Prayerbook from the website set up in 1999 to set out the Spirtuality of St. Ignatius - who founded the Jesuits, the Order of Priests who include Pope Francis as a member.

Thought for today - The Baptism of the Lord - taken from the Prayerbook:

A parishioner who had been attending Mass regularly suddenly stopped going. After a few weeks, the priest decided to visit him. It was a cold evening and the priest found the man sitting alone in front of a blazing coal fire. The man welcomed the priest and invited him to sit at the fire. The priest sat down where invited, but said nothing. He gazed into the fire. After a few minutes he took the pair of tongs and carefully picked up a brightly burning coal from the fire. He placed it on one side of the hearth all on its own. He sat back on his chair, still silent. The man and the priest watched th coal. Gradually, the flame diminished, there was a momentary glow and then the flame went out. Soon it was cold and dead. After a while, the priest got up, took the tongs and returned the dead coal to the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow once more with the light and the warmth of the burning coals around it.

A single lump of coal cannot burn on its own; it takes many lumps of coal to make a fire that does not go out. No Christian can burn for long for God without the constant support of the rest of the Church. WE LINK THE TWO ITEMS PRINTED ABOVE ABOUT THE CHURCH TO:

Fr. Ness welcomes the prospect of always having one parishioner present with him for the celebration of the Eucharist, together with Anne Therese to serve as sacristan whenever her work schedule permits.

On Saturday and Sunday Fr. Ness will arrange for a cantor/reader to be present with him so as to present the Sabbath Day liturgy as close as possible to the form approved by the Church. It is not allowed to have an organist present because that presence isn't necessary. The presence of a Sacristan is necessary AND Anne Therese will be available to read when the parishioner present prefers not to do so.

On Facebook: Daily Mass at 9.30am and every Requiem Mass will be live streamed AND ALSO the Mass at 6PM on Saturday and (during the Weeks of Christmas) also at 10.30AM and 4.30pm on Sunday.

First Holy Communion children in Class P5 and P6/5:

Some of the thity two children will not have received Holy Communion since their first experience of this Sacrament during November. The parish community wants to provide an opportunity as soon as possible for the *children to return to church as one community for this purpose. This was to have been at 2pm on Sunday 24th January*, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Pope Francis has appointed this Sunday in Ordinary Time each year to celebrate that God reveals himself to mankind in both Word through Sacred Scripture and through the Sacraments - the celebration of the Eucharist. As soon as we can with confidence fix another day to substitute for 24th January this year, we will do so and make this known.

Please circulate to any of the families you know in the parish whose children did receive Holy Communion for the first time in November what we now intend to do. We look for all families to **keep in touch with all that is going on in the parish so that they will know about the new date** and so that they can arrange for their child to participate. Waiting to be told will cause your child to miss the opportunity.

Under the heading of Brave new Church? The editor of the Pastoral Review writes this: The markers of [Roman] Catholic identity, the expressions of deep solidarity through coming together to praise God as a Worshipping Community [in Muirhouse], which have been interrupted since last March by several closure orders of Goverment, must be infused with new energy. "Normality" probably won't be good enough now; we must accept that some fellow pilgrims [from our parish] will have gone for ever and the Church must be as brave as Gideon in confronting [facing up to] its mission with fewer companions at arms.

We don't think this is the case in St. Brendan's. Do you think it is the case here?

He is right when he writes this: Like the pruning of a vine, our prayer must be that this [present] crisis will lend more strength [vigour] to growth, a new appreciation of the Eucharist, more power in the holy assembly [of the people of the Parish] and deeper consolation among the faithful people. In short, let us pray that we in St. Brendan's Muirhouse [and other parishes elsewhere] might live out our deepest identity more fully, as beloved children of the Father who together in the Spirit, become the Body of Christ.

Pope Francis describes the role of the lay members of the Church this way: The laity must assume a role of co-responsibility [with the clergy]. *They are used to being passive and told what to do and not to do anything without permission.* Some Roman Catholics do not want to do more than go to Mass and support the parish financially, whereas they need to re-construct their role as co-responsible with the clergy - priests and deacons and religious - for the mission which is Church. The Church doesn't have a mission, the Church is Mission and this should be the deep yearning of all the faithful. In St. Brendan's the priest welcomes the lay people to be co-responsible with him for Mission.

Year B of the three year cycle - ABC - for Sacred Scripture: from Monday we enter the Ordinary Season of the Liturgical Year. We will follow the Gospel of Mark, chapter by chapter. A print of this Gospel is available free of charge from the door of the Church entering from Barons Road.

The Crib and the Christmas Tree: will be removed tomorrow [Monday] morning but parishioners are still asked to make a donation if possible to the St. Margaret's Children and Family Care Society. 
