Bishop Keenan hopes a TV documentary on life in Seminary [Rome] will encourage vocations.

After Mass was televised last Sunday from St. Augustine's church in Coatbridge by the BBC nationally, speaking ahead of the milestone broadcast of a documentary about life as a seminarian in the Scots College in Rome, Bishop John Keenan has revealed he hopes it will encourage new vocations. *Bishop Keenan who is President of the vocations promotion agency "Priests for Scotland" said:*

"The documentary "Priest School" which will be shown on BBC Scotland on tonight at 10.15pm offers a fascinating insight into the life of a seminarian training in Rome to become a priest in Scotland. I really hope that the programme will act as a catalyst for vocations to the priesthood by allowing viewers to see exactly what the life of a student looks like."

"As a former Roman student, who loved his time in Rome, I do remember feeling a sense of trepidation and nerves at the thought of moving to another country and a completely new environment. Being able to visualise seminary life through a documentary in advance would have settled many of my fears!"

"Every year, the Church runs a Vocations Awareness Week, because of the severe restrictions we face this year, the normal work of promoting vocations will be much harder, but in many ways, this programme can fill a void by offering information, insight and detail about the daily lives of Scottish seminarians in Rome. I sincerely hope it causes some of those who watch to consider what it is God wants of them and how they can respond by considering a vocation to the priesthood or religious life."

PARISH AND PARISHIONERS.

- Families with a relative confined to the house and anyone living alone should note that if they wish the Sacrament of the Sick or wish a visit from Fr. Ness this can be arranged by a telephone call to the chapel house. He will be very happy to visit and to do so and will obey the social distancing provisions applicable to all of us.

The parish's Children's Liturgy programme: we want and we try to preserve what the parish and the families of the parish have formed through our Liturgy Team for our children of Primary School age. Our Twitter feed contains items for the children for today on the Scriptures and on activities for home. Margaret Dochnenko will present the spiritual material for the children during our "Online" morning Mass today. A parishioner suggested that we ask the children to give in to Fr. Ness some of their artwork. We'll then post it online on our web page.

Sacramental Preparation for P3 and P4 children the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the P3 children has been postponed to a date yet to be fixed. *A new date will be set for the celebration by* the **P4 children** preparing to receive Holy Communion for the first time. *These children and all children have not been forgotten by us*.

Ecumenism: we continue to pray along with Ian Douglas and our Christian brothers and sisters in St. Margaret's Church of Scotland Parish on Barons Road, but also we note that: TODAY, SUNDAY at 7.00 pm, Thirteen Christian churches and organisations are taking part in a session of communal prayer for the fourth consecutive week, with many of those participating also lighting candles. Perhaps we in this community could remember to light a candle tonight and pray.

The churches have issued this joint statement with this week's prayer:

"As we find ourselves living through a renewed phase of Lockdown, we see in the Gospel of John (20: 19-23) that, in part, the experience of the disciples, even on the day of Resurrection, was one in which they found themselves locked in and behind closed doors.

"Their experience of Lockdown was interrupted by the presence of Jesus as he came and stood among them. He speaks into the depths of their fears and anxieties: 'Peace be with you.' We hear these words and know that they speak to us. We listen again for what he will say and discover that Jesus simply repeats himself: 'Peace be with you.' As we still ourselves, we hear those words of peace spoken and sense that they are spoken to us and to all who long to hear a word that heals and reassures: 'Peace be with you'. *Therefore, let us pray* [abridged version]:

Father, speak into the depths of our experience, Speak the word that stills our fears And calms our anxieties:

'Peace be with you.'

Speak your word to the lonely and to the broken,

To the bereaved and to those whose world has crumbled:

Peace be with you.

'Father speak to us behind locked doors. As we remember others, who risk their own safety, in order to serve others: Peace be with them.

Carers and nurses, doctors and ambulance drivers, Delivery drivers and shop assistants: Peace be with them.

God who inspires Hope, speak to us in the present

And speak to us of the future,

For though the doors are locked, in time they shall be open: Peace shall be renewed.

For those who lead the life of our Nation: Our Queen Elizabeth,

First Minister and Prime Minister, and all who shape our common life,

For us all: Peace shall be renewed.

God whose name is love and whose gift is love, Open our hearts to know you and to love you,

To love you and to love our neighbour

And as we do, to hear again: 'Peace be with you.' May we find our strength in you,

And hear again:

'Peace be with you.'

Our Prayer Life in these times

The priority and the focus of priestly ministry at all times must be to sustain and to nourish the spiritual and the pastoral life of the whole community to which he is sent by the bishop. Both the priest and the people have the opportunity during these days when a lot of time is spent inside our homes, to think about how we can and how we do pray and to give time to prayer. Bishop Toal asked all priests who celebrate Mass and stream this online - which we do using Facebook - to take time to prepare well and preach fully on the Scriptures each day, to explain their deep meaning to parishioners. He also wishes ample time on Sunday to be given over to the children and we do this by the goodness of Margaret and Debbie - two of the Liturgy Team. Gatherings in church may remain suspended for many months. Other leaders may therefore wish to join this ministry to present at Sunday Mass.

We offer prayer time at 12 noon and at 4.30pm. These periods provide material for prayer at home and the times were chosen to suit the families' likely timetable for meals and play.
